Proverbs 31:1 The words of King Lemuel. An oracle that his mother taught him: 2 What are you doing, my son? What are you doing, son of my womb? What are you doing, son of my vows? 3 Do not give your strength to women, your ways to those who destroy kings. 4 It is not for kings, O Lemuel, it is not for kings to drink wine, or for rulers to take strong drink, 5 lest they drink and forget what has been decreed and pervert the rights of all the afflicted. 6 Give strong drink to the one who is perishing, and wine to those in bitter distress: 7 let them drink and forget their poverty and remember their misery no more. 8 Open your mouth for the mute, for the rights of all who are destitute. 9 Open your mouth, judge righteously, defend the rights of the poor and needy. **ESV**

For Reflection & Application:

Monday

Read Proverbs 31:1-2. The words of King Lemuel's mother were spoken thousands of years ago. How do they compare with what a typical mother might say to her adult child today? What does this suggest about the relevance and helpfulness of Scripture?

Tuesday

Read Proverbs 31:3. How would you state the advice this mother is giving in your own words? Is this advice still good and relevant today? Why or why not?

Wednesday

Read Proverbs 31:4-7. What is the primary concern of the mother concerning her son's use of alcohol? How is this different from other common concerns regarding alcohol? Why is this important?

Thursday

Read Proverbs 31:8-9. What is the mother encouraging her son to do? Specifically, how could you follow her advice?

Friday
